

Course Synopsis:

"A History of Christianity in America: From the Colonial Era to the Present" is a Sunday morning course that focuses on the major people, issues and events in American Christianity from the colonial era to the present. In addition to being an in-depth survey of Christianity in America, this course provides an overview of the significant social and political issues in major periods of American history and how Christians impacted – and were affected by – these forces and events. This study also addresses on the ongoing controversies over the proper relationship between church and state, and the challenges and opportunities of living in a society that is becoming increasingly pluralistic, secularistic, and hostile toward traditional Christian beliefs and values.

- The evolution of Britain's religious and political heritage, and how it impacted America;
- Religious diversity in colonial America;
- The founding of the thirteen British colonies, and the impact of Christianity in early colonial history;
